Fifteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time
The Sower: July, 12, 2020

God speaks His Word to us in many ways. Jesus compared the Word of God to a seed, a seed which can make our lives fruitful. However, if a seed is to produce a harvest, it must be planted in good soil. What kind of soil do we offer God's Word? If our lives are barren, it can only mean that we have not allowed God's Word to take root in our hearts. But God does not give up on us.

A family was on vacation, and as they rode down the highway there was a big sign that read "Road Closed." They maneuvered around the sign and continued on. Suddenly the road ended and there was an even larger sign: "What part of 'Road Closed' didn't you understand?" (*Reader's Digest, Laughter Really is the Best Medicine, page 171*)

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us the same, that's why He uses parables: to help those who have trouble understanding His teachings understand what they need to know to be saved. Today and for the next two Sundays, we will hear several of Jesus' parables about the kingdom of heaven. Today's parable and the explanation that goes with it are very clear. God's word is like a seed which can produce life, but if it falls on deaf ears, it produces nothing. It was what Jesus experienced as He traveled from one place another, teaching.

Certainly, from the time of Adam and Eve there have been people who hear God's word, and they respond to it like the hardened earth, or stony ground, or ground thick with weeds.

Like his contemporaries raised in an oral culture—the literacy rate was about 2% in his time—Jesus spoke and taught in stories. All the ancients did this because stories were so effective. They had so many levels of meaning that you couldn't canonize only one, and that made them challenging, diverse, and rich. Moreover, the stories had hidden hooks in them, messages that might only become apparent after you thought about them for a long time. Then it would hit you. Stories also, by nature, expand and evolve over time so that they are able to stimulate the moral imaginations of future generations.

But let's go deeper as I share these stories with you. On the surface, they appear to be entertaining, but in hindsight, they confront us, like many other stories. They make us think morally.

The priest received a phone call from a very irate father who told him in no uncertain terms, "I hold you personally responsible for this!" He was angry because his newly graduated daughter had decided, in his words, "to throw it all away and go do mission work in Haiti with the Jesuit volunteers." "Isn't that absurd!" he went on. "She has an M.B.S. degree from Scranton and she's going off to dig ditches in Haiti! I hold you responsible for this!"

"Why me?" asked the priest. The father said, "You filled her mind with all this religious stuff."

The priest was not intimidated and shot back, "Sir, weren't you the one who had her baptized?" "Well, yes," said the father, "but what does that have to do with anything?"

"And didn't you send her to CCD classes when she was a little girl?" "Well, yes."

"And didn't you allow your daughter to go on those trips to Appalachia when she was in high school?" "Well, yes. I thought it would look good on her résumé. Again, what does that have to do with anything?"

"Sir," said the priest, "You're the reason she's throwing it all away. You introduced her to Jesus, not me."

"But," protested the father, "all we wanted was for her to be raised Catholic." "Well, sorry, sir, but you messed up. You've gone and made a disciple." "Yeah, but . . ."

And that "Yeah, but . . ." exposes our shallowness, doesn't it? We want to be résumé Christians but not serious ones.

Rev. William Barclay, a Church of Scotland minister, shares a story that his friend told him. In the church where this friend worshiped, there was a lonely old man, old Thomas. He had outlived all his friends and hardly anyone knew him. When Thomas died, this friend had the feeling that there would be no one to go to the funeral, so he decided to go so that there might be someone to follow the old man to his last resting-place.

There was no one else, and it was a miserable wet day. The funeral reached the cemetery, and at the gate there was a soldier waiting. An officer, but on his raincoat there were no rank badges. He came to the grave side for the ceremony, then when it was over he stepped forward, and before the open grave swept his hand to a salute that might have been given to a king. The friend walked away with this soldier, and as they walked, the wind blew the soldier's raincoat open to reveal the shoulder badges of a brigadier general.

The general said, "You will perhaps be wondering what I am doing here. Years ago, Thomas was my Sunday School teacher; I was a wild lad and a sore trial to him. He never knew what he did for me, but I owe everything I am or will be to old Thomas, and today I had to come to salute him at the end." Thomas did not know what he was doing. No preacher or teacher ever does. Keep sowing the seed. We can leave the rest to God, including keeping the fire going. And that is GOOD news for all us tenant farmers.

Once there was a famous rabbi who loved to illustrate a truth by means of a story. One day, his students asked him why he adopted this approach. He replied thus: "The best way to answer your question is through a story. There was a time when Truth went around naked and unadorned. But the people shied away from him and gave him no welcome. So Truth wandered through the land, rebuffed and unwanted. One day, very disconsolate, he met Story strolling along happily dressed in a multi-colored robe.

"Truth, why are you so sad?" Story asked. "I am sad because I am so old and ugly that everybody avoids me," Truth replied. "Nonsense!" laughed Story. "That is not why people avoid you. Here, borrow my robe, and see what happens." So Truth donned Story's multi-colored robe, and lo, everywhere he went, he was welcomed.

And the rabbi concluded, "The fact is, people are unable to face the naked Truth; they much prefer the Truth disguised."

Sometimes the truth can be so painful that we are not able to take it straight. We have to dress it up. We have to adorn it. A story makes a bitter truth more palatable. A story has another great advantage. Just as a penny candle can help a searcher to find a gold coin or a priceless pearl, so a short parable can contain a great truth and enable us to penetrate to the heart of that truth.

What is Jesus saying to us in His short parable of the sower?

abandon it. The lives of some people are littered with things started but never finished.

Some seed fell into ground where weeds and thorns lay in wait. It got off to a good start. But then the weeds appeared, and the seed got smothered. People may receive the Word of God, but there are so many other interests in their lives that the most important thing gets crowded out. People are too busy to pray. People are so involved in their careers that they have no time or energy left for the things of the spirit.

Finally, some seed fell on good soil, where it put down deep roots, found nourishment and produced a harvest. So there are people who hear the Word, understand it, and then act on it. Their lives are enriched by it.

God's Word comforts, guides, inspires and challenges us in turn. It is like precious seed. The sower sowed the seed haphazardly: on the path, on the rocks, among the thorns, and on good ground. You might say that he was wasteful and foolish. But there is another way of looking at this. He was extremely generous, even prodigal with the seed. He gives every part of the field a chance to produce something. God keeps on sowing His Word in our hearts even though He knows that much of what He sows will be eaten by the birds, or fall on rocks or among thorns. In nature, the seed has only a short growing season in the early part of the year. Not so with that seed which is the Word of God. Growth can come at any stage in a person's life.

Second Reading — We, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan within ourselves awaiting the redemption of our bodies (Romans 8:18-23).

Gospel — Some seed fell on rich soil and produced fruit (Matthew 13:1-23 [1-9]).

Some important things to keep in mind:

- The dispensation from Sunday Mass and Holy Days of Obligation continues. So if you feel you are under the weather, please do not come to church for any service, including Mass.
- Our brothers and sisters who might be in a vulnerable state are all encouraged NOT to attend the inside Church services until further notice.
- Those who have underlying medical conditions such as diabetes, lung disease, undergoing cancer treatment, or any other illness, are strongly discouraged from coming to Mass for your own safety and the safety of all of those in attendance.
- Those coming to any service in the Church will be required to wear face coverings/masks at all times except when receiving Communion. If you cannot wear a mask during Mass, you are encouraged NOT to attend the inside Church services.

When you arrive, there will be greeters at the doors to welcome you home to St. Ann. The greeters will ask for your name and number again to verify your reservation.

I hope everyone had a wonderful July 4 holiday! As restrictions begin to loosen, let's remember to keep social distancing and masking to protect the vulnerable and elderly in our communities. The best rule of thumb is to refrain from visiting anyone if you or someone in your household are sick. No one wants to intentionally spread the virus, but taking chances with someone else's health is not Christian-like. Remember, we will be in school in less than two months, so stay safe.

Although school is out for summer, we are busy! The St. Ann staff is working harder than ever to ensure we will be using the most proven and up to date procedures to keep all of our students and faculty safe for a return to school. Our free summer lunch program is still offered Monday, Wednesday, & Friday from 11:00 to 1:00.

The 2020-2021 8th grade families will meet virtually on Monday, July 13, at 7:00 p.m. to begin planning graduation activities for next year. We expect great things from this class and nothing says that more than planning ahead.

St. Ann's free online summer school "Tune Up" program will run from July 20 through July 31. We will offer four courses, Monday through Thursday, from 10:00 to 12:00 concurrently. Middle school classes will consist of Personal Finance and Backyard Biodiversity. The primary grades will have two STEM courses in Math & English. Students will be chosen based on their January iREADY test scores, with a maximum of 15 available slots. I will be contacting parents personally to register their children for their individual summer school slots. Keep checking the website and bulletin for the most updated information.

I will host a Virtual Back to School parent meeting on Tuesday, July 28. The primary grade parents will meet at 7 p.m., and the middle school parents' meeting will be at 8:00 p.m. You will receive an email two days before with instructions on how to access the meeting.

Mark your calendars, school tentatively starts on Monday, August 17, with a full day of school for all students including pre-school. Our uniform policy has not changed so please contact our new-old vendor Dennis in Highland for all your school uniform needs. Don't forget current parents, you can earn \$500 in tuition credits for every new family you bring in!


