

THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

As we come to the Fourth Sunday of Advent, we stand on the threshold of Christmas, with hearts full of anticipation and hope. You can tell we are getting near Christmas by the traditional greeting that shoppers give each other in the mall: "I think I was next." Red Skelton's recipe for a good marriage was: "We always hold hands. If I let go, she shops." Our readings today invite us to reflect on the themes of promise, fulfillment, and the humble ways God chooses to enter our world.

In the first reading (Micah 5:1-4a), we hear of a promise made to a small and seemingly insignificant town, Bethlehem. Despite its modest size, it is chosen as the birthplace of a ruler who will shepherd God's people, bringing peace and security. This prophecy reminds us that God often works through the humble and the lowly, transforming the ordinary into the extraordinary. Bethlehem, a town overlooked by many, becomes the cradle of divine promise fulfilled.

The letter to the Hebrews (10:5-10) deepens this theme by

highlighting the obedience and self-giving of Christ. Jesus comes into the world not to offer sacrifices of old, but to do the will of God. His life is a testament to the power of surrender and love, showing us that true fulfillment comes not from external offerings, but from a heart aligned with God's purpose. Jesus embodies the ultimate sacrifice, one that opens the way for us to be in communion with God.


Jesus comes to us in so many ways, but without the Holy Spirit we are unable to recognize Him. But when the Holy Spirit enlightens us, we know the Spirit is pre-

sent. The Spirit helps us see Him present in creation in the Eucharist, in one another, in perhaps the person who drives us crazy, in the poor and suffering and in the unborn who are like Jesus was at that moment in Mary entirely vulnerable, without a voice to speak or cry out.

In the Gospel (Luke 1:39-45), we witness a beautiful encounter between Mary and Elizabeth. Mary, carrying the promise of salvation within her, visits Elizabeth, who is also miraculously with child. Elizabeth's joyful exclamation, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!" echoes the recognition of God's work in the world. This meeting is a celebration of faith and the joy that comes from recognizing God's presence in our lives. When we pay a visit to someone, we see ourselves as doing good to that person. And that is true. But we too benefit. We too are enriched. If only to see how others cope with difficult or near impossible situations. Even among the sick you can find a shining soul. You may have come to give, only to find that you are receiving. You go away buoyed up. To some extent that happens in every visitation. One is blessed by receiving. The other is blessed by giving.

A priest in parish ministry tells of visiting a young woman who was dying of cancer. He went in the hope of bringing her a little comfort. At the end of the visit, he came away feeling that he was the one who was comforted. He marveled at her faith, and at the serenity she had found in the face of death. His own faith was deepened and strengthened by contact with hers.

In the Gospel Mary visits Elizabeth. She herself had just been visited by the angel Gabriel, who had brought her the good news that she was to become the mother of Jesus. However, instead of going off and concentrating on herself, she went with haste to visit Elizabeth, who was also expecting a child. Elizabeth was her cousin. Our first and holiest duty is kindness towards our own kin. However, this doesn't mean it's easy. One's kin can be very demand-



ing. Mary's visit meant a great deal to Elizabeth. But Mary too benefited from it. Elizabeth spoke some lovely words of affirmation and confirmation to her: "Blessed is she who believed that the promise made to her by the Lord would be fulfilled." As the elder and more experienced of the two women, Elizabeth was able to help Mary. Essentially what we have here is two women in the same condition helping one another.

We can receive by giving. And one of the ways we can give is by visitation. Christmas is a great time for visiting people we may

have neglected all year long. Mary's response, her willingness to say "yes" to God's plan, is a model for us. Her journey to Elizabeth is not just a physical one, but a spiritual journey of faith, trust, and love. As we prepare for Christmas, we are called to make our own journey of faith, to open our hearts to God's presence, and to recognize the ways in which we are called to bring Christ into the world.

Let us take these final days of Advent to reflect on the promises God has made to us, how we are called to fulfill His will, and the joy that comes from living in His presence. May we, like Mary and Elizabeth, be filled with the Holy Spirit, ready to embrace the wonder of God's love made manifest in the birth of Jesus. Amen.







Dear Sisters and Brothers,

In this holy season of Christmas, words from the Book of Wisdom echo in our hearts: For while all things were in quiet silence, and the night was in the midst of her course, Thy almighty Word leapt down from Heaven from Thy royal throne, as a fierce conqueror into the midst of the land of destruction. (Wisdom 18:15).


