

# From the Pastor's Pen & STATE OF STATE

#### SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Today's readings beautifully weave together themes of transformation, divine love, and the manifestation of God's glory through various gifts and signs. Let us reflect on how these readings speak to our own journey of faith.

In the first reading (Is 62:1-5), we hear the prophet's passionate declaration of God's love for His people, comparing it to the love between a bridegroom and his bride. "As a young man marries a virgin, your Builder shall marry you; and as a bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so shall your God rejoice in you." This powerful imagery reminds us that God's love for us is not distant or abstract, but inti-

mate and personal, like a marriage covenant.

This theme of marriage flows seamlessly into today's Gospel (Jn 2:1-11), where we witness Jesus's first public miracle at the wedding feast in Cana. This story is about far more than just turning water into wine. It reveals several profound truths about our relationship with God. First, it shows Mary's complete trust in her son when she states, "They have no wine," and then tells the servants, "Do whatever He tells you." Her confidence in Jesus's ability to help is a model for our own trust in God.

The transformation of water into wine symbolizes the transformative power of Christ in our lives. Just as Jesus turned ordinary water into extraordinary wine, He can transform our ordinary lives into something extraordinary when we trust in Him. The six stone jars, used for ceremonial washing, represent the old covenant, while the new wine represents the new covenant that Jesus brings.

We see many occasions and many individuals in the Gospels who were touched and changed by the power of Jesus; Jesus brought the wine of God's love into the world. Eve-

rywhere He went the old was made new. For the couple at Cana, He changed water into wine. For the widow of Nain, He changed tears into joy. For Zacchaeus, He changed selfishness into love. For the thief on Calvary, He changed despair into hope. And on Easter morning He changed death into life. Lord, be present with us today and throughout our lives. And when through human weakness the wine of love is found wanting, touch our hearts and strengthen our wills, so that we may taste the wine of unselfish love.

But how does this transformation happen in our daily lives? The second reading from Paul's letter to the Corinthians (I Cor 12:4-11) gives us insight. Paul explains that the Spirit distributes different gifts to different people—wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, mighty deeds, prophecy, discernment, tongues, and interpretation. Each gift is given for the benefit of the community, not for individual

glory. Just as the servants at the wedding feast participated in Jesus's miracle by following His instructions, we are called to use our God-given gifts to serve others and manifest God's glory. The wedding at Cana teaches us another important lesson: Jesus cares about all aspects of our lives, even something as seemingly mundane as running out of wine at a wedding. No concern is too small to bring to Him. Mary's intervention also reminds us of the power of intercessory prayer: bringing others' needs before the Lord.

As we reflect on these readings, let us ask

ourselves: Do we truly trust in God's transformative power in our lives? Are we using our spiritual gifts to serve others and build up the community? Do we bring all our concerns, big and small, to the Lord? Do we have Mary's confidence to say, "Do whatever He tells you?"

Remember, just as Jesus saved the best wine for last at the wedding feast, God often has greater plans for all of us than we can imagine. Let us open our hearts to His transformative love and be ready to serve as instruments of His grace in the world. May God bless you all. Amen.



The entire passage chosen for reflection is John 11:17-27, where Jesus arrives in Bethany and raises Lazarus from the dead. A part of that story is the encounter between Jesus and Martha, at the end of which Martha confesses faith in Jesus as the Messiah and Son of God.

The theme for 2025 was proposed by the ecumenical monastic community of Bose in Italy, in cooperation with the international team appointed by the Catholic Church's Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity and the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches, at meetings in Bose in late September 2023.

The year 2025 marks the 1,700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, the first Ecumenical Council of Christian churches, called by Emperor Constantine I. The Council took place in Nicaea, a place just outside Constantinople (now Istanbul), from May to July of 325. This was just 12 years after a meeting between the co-emperors Constantine and Licinius in February 313 in Milan, at which they agreed to grant legal status to Christianity. The so-called "Edict of Milan," actually a letter from Licinius to governors of provinces in the Eastern Empire, granted Christians and all persons within the empire freedom from religious persecution.

Having then just emerged from a type of "underground" status of nearly 300 years, the diversity of language, culture and hierarchical organization created situations of theological divisions within the Church. There was an urgent need for one unified voice for the sake of orthodox doctrine, especially about the nature of Jesus's relationship to the Father within the being of the Triune God. There was also a need to establish a common date for Easter and a way to reconcile Christians who had lapsed under the period of persecution. A major result of the Council was the creation of the first Nicene Creed. Tradition has it that there were 318 bishops present, mostly from Eastern churches, and that all but two signed the Creed.

Considering divergences of interpretation on the "settled" date of Easter agreed at the Council, followed by separate dates again for centuries, it is of special significance that in 2025, all Christians have the same date for Easter: April 20.

As the whole Church of today considers the commemoration of a gathering that signified a belief in "one, holy, catholic and apostolic church," may we all be more and more drawn into the mystery of unity. May we confess our resistance to that unity, embrace our diversity and remember exactly what we believe together and share with the world: that Jesus is the Christ and the Son of God, who raises all with him to eternal life in a kingdom that will never



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Each year from January 18-25 Christians around the world observe the "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity." During this week, we join Jesus' prayer that his disciples be united, as he and his Father are one, "so that the world may believe" (John 17:21). As we learned at the recently completed Synod on Synodality, promoting Christian unity is essential to becoming a truly synodal Church. "Ecumenical dialogue is foundational to developing an understanding of synodality and the unity of the Church" (Final Document, par. 137).

The theme for the 2025 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, ""Do You Believe?" was proposed by the ecumenical monastic community of Bose in Italy, in cooperation with the international team appointed by the Vatican Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity and the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches. The year 2025 marks the 1,700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, the first Ecumenical Council of Christian churches, called by Emperor Constantine I from May to July of 325.

During this year's "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity," I encourage you to assess your belief in the statement of faith of Nicaea. How does this ancient creedal statement bind all Christians as one and call us to live out this unity? Furthermore, "may we confess our resistance to that unity, embrace our diversity, and remember exactly what we believe together and share with the world: that Jesus is the Christ and the Son of God, who raises all with him to eternal life in a kingdom that will never end." (see 2025 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: Theme & Materials - Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute)

Inspired by Pope Francis' recent encyclical "Dilexit Nos," please take time each day during this week to ask the Holy Spirit to enter into your heart and the hearts of all Christians to draw us ever closer to one another in Christ. If possible, join other Christians in praying for unity in your home, neighborhood, or online.
