3 RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME





THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Fulfilled in Your Hearing

The readings for this Third Sunday of Ordinary Time present a rich tapestry of themes centered around the Word of God, community, and Jesus's mission. Let's explore these readings individually and consider their implications for our lives today.

First Reading—Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10: In this passage, we find Ezra the priest reading the Law to the people of Israel. This event marks a significant moment of renewal and recommitment to God's covenant. The people listen

attentively, and their response is one of worship and reverence. They are moved to tears, recognizing both their failures and the grace of God that calls them back into relationship. This reading reminds us of the power of God's Word to transform hearts and communities. It challenges us to consider how we engage with Scripture in our own lives. Are we open to being changed by it? Do we allow it to guide our actions and decisions? Just as the Israelites found joy and strength in understanding God's Word, we too are invited to find joy in our faith and to share it with others.

Second Reading—1 Corinthians 12:12-30: Paul's letter to the Corinthians emphasizes the unity and diversity of the Body of Christ. Each member has a unique role and gift, and all are essential for the functioning of the whole. This metaphor of the body highlights the importance of collaboration and mutual support within the Christian community. The message from this reading is that we are each unique in the gifts and talents God has given to us, and therefore, we all have different tasks to fulfill as members of the Body of Christ. This message is particularly relevant in our individualistic society. We are reminded that our gifts are

Today's Readings

First Reading: Ezra read plainly from the book of the law of God, interpreting it so that all could understand what was read. (Neh 8:8)

Psalm: Your words, Lord, are Spirit and life. (Ps 19) **Second Reading:** For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit. (1 Cor 12:12)

Gospel: He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." (Lk 1:21)

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not for our benefit alone but are meant to serve the community. How do we use our talents to build up the Church and support one another? Are we willing to recognize and value the contributions of others, even when they differ from our own? This reading continues to call each of us to celebrate our diversity and work together for the common good.

Gospel—Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-2: In the Gospel, we see Jesus returning to Nazareth and proclaiming His mission in the synagogue. He reads from the scroll of Isaiah, declaring that He is the fulfillment of this prophecy. Jesus identifies His mission as bringing good news to the poor, proclaiming freedom for the prisoners, recovering sight for the blind, and setting the oppressed free. This passage is a powerful reminder of the transformative mission of Jesus,

which continues through us today. As followers of Christ, we are called to carry on His work of compassion, justice, and liberation. How do we respond to this call in our daily lives? Are we attentive to the needs of those around us, and do we strive to bring hope and healing to the suffering?

In the week ahead, let's take this mission to heart, examining the way we can use our gifts and talents for this mission and asking ourselves what it looks like in our unique circumstances to "bring glad tidings to the poor," "liberty to captives," "sight to the blind," and "freedom to the op-

pressed." It might feel uncomfortable at first. But the good news is you don't have to do it all. Do your part, let your brothers and sisters in the Body of Christ do theirs, and know that the Spirit of the Lord is upon us all as we live out this stewardship way of life. As we participate in Jesus' mission, may we find joy and strength in knowing that we are part of a larger community, united in faith and purpose. Amen.





Estimados amigos en Cristo:

En nochebuena, nuestro Santo Padre abrió la Puerta Santa de la Basílica de San Pedro, inaugurando así el Año de Jubileo de la Esperanza 2025. De hecho, Cristo es nuestra Esperanza y en Él depositamos nuestras esperanzas personales para el año que viene. Sin embargo, en medio de este llamado a la esperanza, muchos de nuestros hermanos y hermanas en los márgenes están experimentando gran miedo y ansiedad. Pienso en particular en nuestras comunidades inmigrantes.

Mucho se ha dicho de lo que podría sucederles a algunos de nuestros vecinos a partir de las próximas semanas y meses. Como pueblo de esperanza, es importante que hagamos lo que es correcto y necesario para infundir confianza a quienes tienen miedo, haciéndoles saber que la Iglesia está con ellos.

Como Cuerpo de Cristo, servimos a los necesitados, al respetar y promover la dignidad inherente de cada persona que llega a nuestra puerta. Al mismo tiempo, las parroquias, escuelas y entidades de la Arquidiócesis de Chicago deben cumplir con las leyes y regulaciones federales, estatales y locales.

La Arquidiócesis de Chicago está trabajando con la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de Estados Unidos, Caridades Católicas, gobiernos estatales y locales y otros grupos para coordinar nuestras actividades de apoyo en los condados de Cook y Lake. Como estamos llamados a hacerlo, nuestra prioridad será llevar a Cristo a este tiempo de miedo e incertidumbre. Al preguntar: "¿Qué nos está diciendo Dios en este momento?" ayudamos a las familias a ver que Dios está con ellas, incluso en sus miedos. Este enfoque; enraizado en la oración, la solidaridad y la acción tangible, demuestra que la Iglesia Católica, a través de sus recursos y fe únicos, ofrece un faro de esperanza. Juntos, llevamos amor, acompañamiento y la seguridad de que nadie está solo.

Dirigiéndose este año a los embajadores acreditados ante la Santa Sede, el Santo Padre observó que la gobernanza de la migración necesita equilibrar la regulación con los derechos humanos y la dignidad: "Olvidamos fácilmente que se trata de personas con rostros y nombres". El papa Francisco también ha sido claro en que "el principio de repatriación segura y voluntaria de quienes se ven obligados a huir debe respetarse estrictamente. Nadie debe ser repatriado a un país donde podría enfrentar graves violaciones de derechos humanos o incluso la muerte".

Sigamos trabajando juntos en este espíritu, y seamos instrumentos de misericordia llenos de fe que honran la dignidad humana de todas las personas.

On Christmas Eve, our Holy Father opened the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica inaugurating the 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope. Indeed, Christ is our Hope and in Him we place our personal hopes for the year ahead. Yet amid this call to hope, many of our brothers and sisters on the margins are experiencing great fear and anxiety. I am thinking in particular of our immigrant communities.

Much has been said of what might happen to some of our neighbors beginning in the coming weeks and months. As people of hope, it is important that we do what is right and necessary to instill confidence in those who are afraid, letting them know that the Church is with them.

As the Body of Christ, we serve those in need, respecting and promoting the inherent dignity of every person who arrives on our doorstep. At the same time, parishes, schools and entities of the Archdiocese of Chicago must adhere to federal, state and local laws and regulations.

The Archdiocese of Chicago is working with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Catholic Charities, state and local governments and other groups to coordinate our activities of support in Cook and Lake Counties. Please find a collection of resources on our website at https://www.archchicago.org/news-and-events/immigrant-assistance-resources.

As we are called to do, we will prioritize bringing Christ into this time of fear and uncertainty. By asking, "What is God telling us in this moment?" we help families see that God is with them, even in their fears. This approach—rooted in prayer, solidarity, and tangible action—demonstrates that the Catholic Church, through its unique resources and faith, offers a beacon of hope. Together, we bring love, accompaniment, and the reassurance that no one is alone.

Speaking this year to the ambassadors accredited to the Holy See, the Holy Father observed that migration governance needs to balance regulation with human rights and dignity. "We are quick to forget that we are dealing with people with faces and names." Pope Francis has also been clear that "the principle of safe and voluntary repatriation of those who are forced to flee must be strictly adhered to. No one should be repatriated to a country where they could face severe human rights violations or even death."

Let us continue to work together in this spirit, and be faith-filled instruments of mercy honoring the human dignity of all persons.


