SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME The World of The Beatitudes

This weekend's readings invite us to reflect deeply on the source of our trust and the foundation of our hope. This essential quality for the Christian steward, hope is especially fitting this year, as Pope Francis has designated 2025 as a Jubilee Year with the theme, "Pilgrims of Hope."

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit (CCC 1817)."

In many ways, this is the very definition of a stewardship way of life — focusing on eternity as we live our daily lives and relying on God to provide for our needs and satisfy our deepest longings for meaning and happiness right now.

In the first reading (Jer 17:5-8), we hear a stark contrast between those who place their trust in human strength and those who trust in the Lord. Jeremiah paints a vivid picture: those who trust in mere mortals are like shrubs in the desert, unable to see prosperity when it comes. In contrast, those who trust in the Lord are like trees planted by water, their roots reaching deep, untroubled by heat or drought, always bearing fruit.

This imagery challenges us to examine where we place our trust. In times of difficulty and uncertainty, do we rely solely on our own abilities, or do we turn to God, the source of living water? Trusting in the Lord does not mean

that we will not face challenges, but it assures us that we will have the strength and resilience to endure and thrive, much like the tree by the water.

In the second reading (1 Cor 15:12, 16-20), Paul addresses the Corinthians, affirming the core of our Christian faith: the resurrection of Christ. He emphasizes that if Christ had not been raised, our faith would be futile. But Christ has indeed been raised, becoming the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. This truth is the bedrock of our hope. It assures us that death is not the end and that our lives are anchored in the promise of eternal life.



Finally, in today's Gospel (Lk 6:17, 20-26), we hear the Beatitudes, where Jesus turns the world's values upside down. He declares blessed those who are poor, hungry, weeping, and persecuted, while warning those who are rich, well-fed, and comfortable. Jesus is not condemning material wealth or comfort, but rather he is inviting us to recognize where true blessing lies. It is not in worldly success or comfort but in our relationship with God and solidarity with those in need. This Gospel challenges us to live with a spirit of humility and compassion, to see beyond the superficial measures

of success, and to find our true joy and fulfillment in serving others and living according to God's will.

As we reflect on these readings, let us ask ourselves: Where do we place our trust? How does the promise of the resurrection shape our lives? And how can we live out the Beatitudes in our daily interactions? May we be like the tree planted by the water, drawing strength from our faith in God, and bearing fruit in love and service to others. Let us go forth with renewed trust in the Lord, confident in the hope of the resurrection, and committed to living the values of the Gospel. Amen.

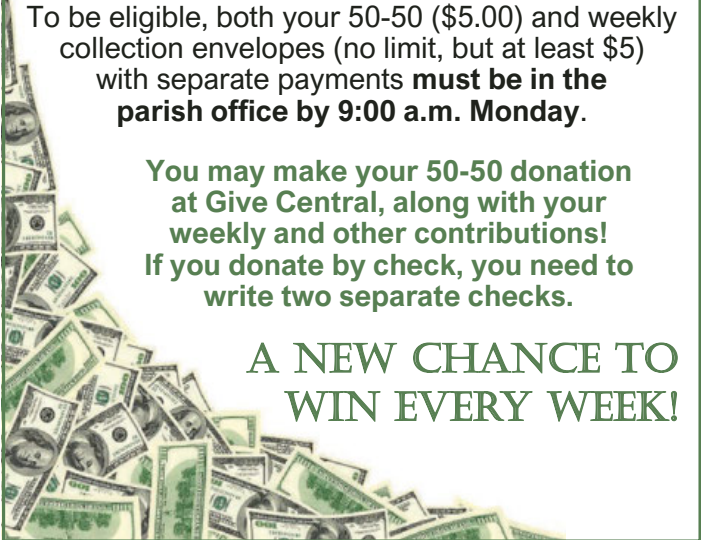

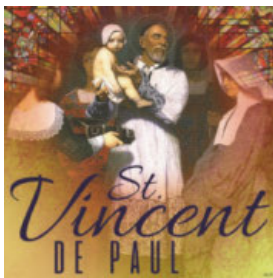
✦ **FUNDRAISING NEWS:**

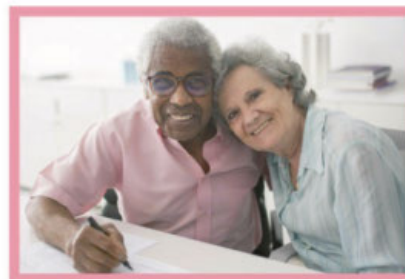
